- 11. a) India's great moral leader Mohandas Gandhi famously said that there is enough on Earth for everybody's need, but not enough for everybody's greed. Today, Gandhi's insight is being put to the test as never before. The environment is the most discussed topic in all international forums. How relevant is the statement of Gandhiji's today?
 - b) What are your duties and rights as a student and as a professional? Give two examples each to support your answer.
- 12. a) Kathryn was employed at a large retail store at the mall. Her responsibilities were to straighten and stock merchandise, handle telephone orders, and sell to customers in her department of the store. It was also her responsibility to be alert to shoplifters and vandals who might steal or damage merchandise. Sometimes the store was very crowded and customers had to wait to be checked out at her register. Sometimes Kathryn's friends would come into the store to shop or visit. She enjoyed their company and was always glad to see them. Once, however, she was very busy with customers when friends came to visit, and she saw one of the friends steal an item of clothing from her department. She looked the

other way and pretended not to see the theft. After visiting with her, the friends left the store to go to a movie. The person who stole the merchandise took it and left with the group. Kathryn's conscience does not permit her to be silent nor did she want to complain against her friend.

Situation 2

You got up late in the morning. You know you are going to get delayed in catching your regular bus. You try to hurry up in getting ready. You misplaced you ID and shouted at your brother for misplacing it who obviously retorted back. You suddenly realize that you are getting under stress. So, you apologize to your brother. You time up your delay. 15 minutes more is what you would require. You know you cannot take the bus. You plan an alternative.

- Q. Which stage were you in and which stage are you transiting to? Briefly explain the two reactions.
- 13. a) Rohit Narang joined Apex Computers (Apex) in November after a successful stint at Zen Computers (Zen), where he had worked as an assistant programmer. Rohit felt that Apex offered better career prospects, as it was growing much faster than Zen, which was a relatively small company. Rohit joined as a Senior Programmer at Apex, with a handsome pay hike. He joined Aparna Mehta's five-member team. While she was efficient at what she did and extremely intelligent, she had neither the time nor the inclination to groom her subordinates. Time and again, Rohit found himself thinking of Suresh, his old boss, and of how he had been such a positive influence. Aparna, on the other hand, even without actively doing anything, had managed to significantly lower his motivation levels.
 - Q. What, according to you, were the reasons for Rohit's disillusionment? Answer the question using Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs.
 - b) Three women were meant to meet at a restaurant at 5.00pm. Two of the women arrived on time, however Angie was running late. Time continued to tick by. At 5.15pm one of the women, Maria could not help but look at her watch and began to feel anxious. Lucy, the other woman saw this and told her not to worry. Lucy ordered a drink and did not think any more of it as Angie was renowned for being late. Another 10 minutes passed. Maria could not stop looking at the time and expressed her worry, suggesting that Angie may have been involved in a car accident. Lucy remained calm, reminding Maria that Angie was coming from work and was most probably stuck in peak hour traffic. Maria did not even listen to Lucy's explanation. Panicking further, Maria tried calling Angie to find out

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where she was. Angie did not answer, reinforcing Maria's worry even further. Lucy reminded Maria that Angie was driving and that she cannot answer her phone while driving. Another ten minutes went by and Angie rushed in. Lucy said "Look, there she is, she is just fine like I told you." Maria was still not convinced, rushing over to their friend to see if she was ok. It turned out that Angie had to stay back for an important meeting at work. Lucy and their friend started talking and began looking at the menu. Maria however, did not believe her friend entirely, still thinking that there must be another, more troublesome explanation for her friend's late arrival. She was so anxious that she did not eat and continued to think about what 'could' have happened for the rest of the night.

Asha is a researcher at a media agency led by Dr. Purshottam, a well-known journalist.

In the first few months of Asha's employment, Dr. Purshottam is very pleased with her work and publicly appreciates her. Soon after, Dr. Purshottam frequently summons Asha to his office on the pretext of work and makes verbal sexual advances and sexually coloured remarks to her. He brushes aside her protests by saying that they would not be able to work as a team unless she interacted closely with him and they both got to know each other well. However, once she categorically rebuffed his sexual advances, he has stopped. Now he *ridicules her work* and *humiliates* her in the presence of colleagues and the staff. He *discriminates* against her by allotting projects to her and then arbitrarily withdrawing the work.

What should Asha do in this situation?
